- First held in 2019, Taiwan response to rising chemsex prevalence
- Critical platform connecting community, HCPs, NGOs/CSOs, researchers, policymakers & donors across Asia-Pacific
- Culturally sensitive, safe, multi-disciplinary space for dialogue, knowledge sharing, and collaboration

APCS 2024

- 6th meeting, held on November 6-7, 2024, in Bangkok, Thailand (first time outside Taiwan)
- Theme: "Pleasures, Policies, Possibilities"
- 300+ participants from 27 countries

"Pleasures, Policies, Possibilities"

Pleasures

Shift from risk-based to pleasure-based; a more balanced, humane lens — understanding why people engage in chemsex

Policies

Address legal, structural & stigma barriers; engage policymakers, legal experts & law enforcement

Possibilities

Beyond abstinence — explore new harm reduction & service models

Not all drug use is 'problematic'

NON-USE

Avoiding use of substances (abstinence)

Example: No drugs, tobacco or alcohol

BENEFICIAL USE

Use that can have positive health, social, or spiritual effects

Example: Taking medication as prescribed, ceremonial/ religious use of tobacco (such as smudging)

LOWER-RISK USE

Use that has minimal impact to a person, their family, friends and others

Example: Drinking following the <u>low-risk alcohol drinking</u> <u>guidelines</u>, cannabis use according to the <u>lower-risk</u> <u>cannabis use guidelines</u>

HIGHER-RISK USE

Use that has a harmful and negative impact to a person, their family, friends and others

Example: Use of illegal drugs, impaired driving, binge drinking, combining multiple substances, increasing frequency, increasing quantity

ADDICTION

(Substance use disorder)

A treatable medical condition that affects the brain and involves compulsive and continuous use despite negative impacts to a person, their family, friends and others

Example: When someone cannot stop using drugs, tobacco or alcohol even if they want to

A person may move back and forth between the stages over time


Freedom and confidence to explore sexual fantasies

To build a pleasure-inclusive world, love yourself. Show kindness to yourself and others. Collaborate with and promote other pleasure champions.



ENBRACE LEARNING

There is a growing body of evidence about the impact of pleasure positive approaches on sexual health. Use this knowledge to spread sex positivity.



TALK SEXY

Pleasure-positive messaging communicate positively & effectively. Adopt evidence-based pleasure-inclusive language and imagery across your media and mediums.



OF FLEXIBLE

Be adaptive in your approach to each unique context and culture. Recognise that pleasure-based sexual health is possible for all.



UNIVERSAL

Everyone has the ability to experience pleasure. Recognise individual difference: and identities, and ensure everyone is included in pleasure-based sexual health.



GHTS FIRST

Sexual rights and human rights are core to a person's sexuality
These are the building blocks of pleasure-based sexual health



* POSITIVE

Core to all the Pleasure



UN Special Rapporteur on the Right to Health 2024: **Drug use, harm reduction and the right to health**



- Right to give informed consent to treatment
- Right to information
- Right to privacy, e.g. confidentiality of personal health data
- Right to bodily integrity, e.g. mandatory testing of drug use may be a violation
- State obligation to implement evidence-based interventions to minimize the adverse health and risks and harms associated with drug use

Recommendation: **Decriminalize** the use, possession, purchase and cultivation of drugs for personal use and move toward alternative regulatory approaches that put the protection of people's health and other human rights front and centre.



Decriminalization of substance use and possession for use needs tangible and concerted actions – communities, researchers, providers, legal experts, policy makers.

To provide clinical service providers with an understanding and awareness of chemsex, to enable effective communication in a nonjudgmental manner with clients who may be at risk of HIV, viral hepatitis and STIs and other harms from their use of drugs. In doing so, clinical service providers can assist clients by providing support, education, referrals and offer HIV, viral hepatitis and STI prevention and treatment services and other harm reduction strategies to improve clients' sexual, physical, psychological health and social comorbidities.

RECOVERY BEHAVIOR MANAGEMENT (incl. CUT DOWN & CESSATION

- Supports for reducing dose and frequency (CBT, MI,...)
- Cut down, cessation of drugs and prevent reuse

Chemsex Intervention Package

The following interventions are for outreach workers (ORWs) who offer advice to people who participate in chemsex. They are based on the harm reduction approach: they aim to promote the health and well-being of people who participate in chemsex. They focus on positive change and on working with people without judgement or requiring that they stop (or reduce) their drug use. These interventions do not seek to encourage risk behaviour, their intention is to provide clients



with a knowledge base and to empower them with skills to promote their well-being.

Interventions are structured into categories of interventions that should be offered before a person attends a session, during the session, and after the person has left the session. These categories are split into subsections which describe. (in emboldened brackets). whether they are aimed at promoting the person's physical, mental, or sexual health.

ORWs can adapt the implementation of these interventions based on their characteristics/ personality, and the context, personality, and personal situation of their clients.
